PRICE showcases works in various settings, including museums, theatres, site-specific venues, and clubs. He lives and works mainly between Europe and Brazil. The medium of scent is playing an increasingly pivotal role in his artistic practice, sparking an exploration of the politics inherent in both social and private spaces. PRICE delves deep into the conflicting dynamics that exist within these socially normative categories, presenting trans-disciplinary concepts through time-based works, such as performances, sonic interventions, installations, and sculptures where scent acts like an extension of what is exhibited or performed.

In A Repressed Repertoire (sequences), performance and visual artist PRICE continues his interest in stage design and the affectability of the voice. The work consists of a series of performances in which the artist calls on friendship and local artists' communities across music, performance and the visual arts. Staged as a dinner, the invited performers, including PRICE, draw from found dialogues derived from Hollywood film scripts. Suspended by musical interludes, guttural noises, facial expressions and blunt silences, the scripted gatherings (ab)use interruption and discontinuity to reveal the force of the unsaid in and through speech. An inflated reenactment of forced sociability, the work equally points to the beauty of togetherness. Where the scenography presents an elegantly dressed dining table with delicate glass sculptures reminiscent of tableware both chic and cute, the performers present their best selves, incessantly digesting the text, looks and sounds thrown at them. The glass dishes host rose-scented talcum powder brought into play by the performers on their own terms. The dissemination of the powder produces miniature clouds exuding an air of hide-and-seek, like a veneer of composure masquerading what's "really" going on. Creating frameworks for staging, it reinvents the smoke machine. Pregnant with unconsciously stored desires and hardship, the I's convening at the table can never be fully in control. Nonsovereign at best, they may be loving and open, but problematically noncommittal or explicitly shady, too. When the performers leave, an ambivalent, somewhat familiar odor of sugar-sweet flower hangs in the air, an olfactory transfiguration of what remains repressed. Yoking the subdued, bourgeois sophistication of tasteful/tasty get-togethers to the nostalgia of muted emotionality, A Repressed Repertoire (sequences) is presented in the North-American context for the first time. It rests on the availability and eagerness of cross-disciplinary trade-offs, asking each artist to test out their seat and persona at a dinner table not quite of their own choosing. Leaving ample room for pause and zoom-in, the performers' subtle arrangements bring into play the unspoken drama and necessity of conviviality, food, and love. During moments of anxiety, the performers may stage their unease by freely employing song, instruments and voice. Whether outcry or whisper, their voices become vectors gauging the emotional limits of what can be digested.
